Community Cleanup Day 2023

Not much trash to be found, but a delightful Post-Pickup Party!

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On Saturday morning, Sept. 23, after a two-year hiatus, PMKCA members, residents, friends, and visitors from far away, took to the roadsides of mauka Pa'auilo and Kalopā to pick up trash and take a look at the

condition of our roads. Of our sixteen named roads covering approximately 21 miles of asphalt and gravel, more than half of them received some attention.

The happy news is that, generally speaking, the collectors reported that the amount of trash found and collected was very light, even on our most trafficked roads!

Many of the road crews – not all, regretfully – gathered afterwards at Denning's house on Kula Kahiko for refreshments and pupus to get acquainted and talk story. The food was abundant, the drinks were rejuvenating, and the conversations were... just exceptional!

Here are some highlights from our "apres-trash" party:

The crews covered at least these ten roads: Kalopa Mauka Rd., Keahua Rd., parts of Ka'apahu Rd., Apelahama Rd., Kula Kahiko Rd., Ho'o Kahua Rd., Kukuipapa Rd., parts of Pohakea Rd. and some sections of Pa'auilo Mauka Rd. And, of course, the heralded Waika'alulu Rd. (An inside joke.)

I said this already – our roads are relatively clean! Speculating on why that might be true, we credited two things: 1) a growing community awareness and appreciation for what we have, and 2) the habit that some of our residents have of regularly walking the roads for exercise, carrying a bag to pick up refuse.

Wondering about the relative abundance of aluminum cans that seemed to have been viciously torn apart, we imagined the drinkers who couldn't get their cans open fast enough! That vision was dispelled when Joe suggested that the county mowing equipment was the culprit! Aha!

Joe had parked his truck at the bottom of Denning's driveway to receive the trash bags from the partygoers. He said later that his truck was less than half full! It's likely that the collectors who didn't or couldn't attend

the party had disposed of their bags on their own.

I'm aware that more folks volunteered to cover roads than came to the party afterwards, so it's hard to say how many people and how many of our roads received attention. Still, I know that we are all very proud of our community and are quite willing to play a role in keeping it beautiful and safe.
